Constitution of the Yates County Agricultural Society

Adopted AD 1868, and Revised 1875-1885-1970-1976-1980-1986

ARTICLE

The name of the Society shall be "The Yates County Agricultural Society". Its object shall be to promote and improve the Agricultural, Horticultural, Mechanical and Household Arts of Yates County.

This organization shall not be operated for profit, and all income and earnings of the organization shall be used exclusively for organizational purposes, and no part of the net income, net earnings of assets of the organization shall inure to the benefit or profit of any private individual, firm, corporation or association.

Nothing contained in the enabling documents shall authorize the organization to carry on propaganda or otherwise attempt to influence legislation, or to participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), a political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Upon the dissolution of the organization the Board of Directors or Trustees shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the organization, dispose of all of the assets of the organization exclusively for charitable and educational purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the Board of Directors or Trustees shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE

2.

An exhibitor's ticket of \$15.00 must be purchased by each exhibitor in Adult Department and same must accompany list of entries and entry fee. Upon payment this ticket will be issued by the Secretary which entitles the exhibitor, upon identification, to admission to the grounds during the Fair, day or night.

ARTICLE 3.

The officers of the Society shall be President, 1st Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President, 3rd Vice-President, General Manager, Secretary, Treasurer, and twenty-four Directors. Eight Directors shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Society which shall be held on the first Wednesday of December, each year. All other officers shall constitute and Executive Committee, of which nine members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE

4.

The President shall have the authority to appoint persons to the position of Director as vacancies exist, said appointments to be approved or rejected by the Board at the next annual meeting.

They shall take charge of distribute of preserve all seeds, plans, books, or other effects which may be presented to the Society.

Constitution of the Yates County Agricultural Society

ARTICLE 4. (CONT'D)	They shall exercise general supervision over the affairs of the Society and shall appropriate funds in such manner as in their judgment shall best promote the objects of the Society.	
	It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to regulate and award premiums on such articles, productions and improvements as they shall deem best calculated to promote the agricultural, horticultural, mechanical, household and manufacturing interest of the County.	
	They shall cause all necessary preparations to be made for the Annual County Fair and give good and sufficient notice of the time and place and premiums to be awarded thereat.	
	They shall appoint a day or days and a place for holding the Annual Fair which Fair shall be held at any time they shall deem best.	
	The Board of Directors have full power to do any and all business of the Society by a vote of two-thirds of the Directors present.	
ARTICLE 5.	The President and Secretary may call extra meetings of the Society at their discretion.	
ARTICLE 6.	All transactions of the Society and its Executive Committee shall be recorded in minute books to be kept for that purpose.	
ARTICLE 7.	All reports of the Society or the Executive Committee shall be in writing, signed by the party making the same.	
ARTICLE 8.	The Constitution may be altered or amended at the annual meeting of the Society by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.	
ARTICLE 9.	All Officers, Directors and Superintendents elected at the annual meeting automatically become members of the Society.	
ARTICLE 10.	Honorary Directors shall be appointed by the President and approved at the annual meeting by two-thirds of the members present. Honorary Directors shall have lifetime membership and be granted all privileges to the officers, directors, and superintendents with the exception of voting privileges.	









GENERAL RULES

- 1. All exhibits in any department, except for the Junior Department, are open to the world, except as directors may decide or to the capacity of our facilities.
- 2. All exhibits will be under the control of the officers and the Board of Directors, but the Society will in no event be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 3. Vendors of merchandise will be allowed on the grounds only on obtaining a license.
- 4. Concessionaires must keep their spaces in a neat and sanitary condition removing there from all filth and refuse and placing it in garbage cans.
- 5. No disorderly conduct, immoral or lewd exhibitors will be allowed on the grounds. This rule will be enforced by the Yates County Sherriff's Department.
- 6. Exhibitors, after having properly entered their articles with the Secretary, must deliver them to the Superintendent of the appropriate department. The cards furnished by the Secretary to the exhibitor must be attached to the article exhibited in a conspicuous manner and remain thereon during the Fair.
- 7. ALL ANIMAL ENTRIES DUE June 30th. All other entries due the day before the opening of the Fair. For animals, late entries may be accepted on a space available basis, at the discretion of the Superintendent. Late entries must pay double the entry fee. Articles entered for premiums must be in place as follows: Fruit, School, Farm, Garden, Dairy Cattle, Beef Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Antique Engines, Domestic Arts, 4-H and FFA must be in place at 12 noon the opening day of the Fair.
- 8. Articles entered for premiums must be in place as follows: Fruit, School, Farm, Garden, Dairy Cattle, Beef Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Antique Engines, Domestic Arts, 4-H and FFA must be in place at 12 noon the opening day of the Fair.
- 9. All entries must be in the name of the actual owner or some member of their family and must remain on the grounds until 6:00 pm on the last day, unless excused by the Secretary. Ownership must be proven if required.
- 10. No animal or article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium. Junior project exception. Animals competing for premiums may, however, compete for herd or flock prizes. This rule may be waived by department Superintendent.
- 11. Premium cards have no value as to payment of premiums. Premiums are paid only from the record of the awarding judges book.
- 12. The Society reserves the right to withhold the premium awarded in any case where it shall appear that the rules and regulations have not been complied with, or fraud or deception practiced or attempted.
- 13. Exhibits that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to the proper class upon application to the Secretary.
- 14. All judge's books shall remain with the Secretary when not in actual use.
- 15. The Secretary is empowered to refuse any or all entries that are not deemed best for the interests of the department.
- 16. Any exhibitor detected making any attempt to acquaint the judge with the names of the owner or any article or animal entered for competition before the premiums are awarded will be barred from receiving any prize. The rule will be enforced rigidly.

- 17. None but tuberculin tested cattle will be allowed on the grounds of the Society.
- 18. Entries in all classes of livestock, except grades, must be purebred and pedigree furnished when required.
- 19. Regardless of competition, no article or animal not deserving will receive any premium.
- 20. The Society endeavors to obtain the best judges possible. Any persons interfering with or dictating to any judge will forfeit all premiums to the Society.
- 21. The grounds will be ready for the reception of commercial exhibits after 10 am on the day prior to the opening day of the Fair.
- 22. The Fair Grounds will be patrolled. Anyone caught attempting illegal entry will be prosecuted at once.
- 23. Entries will be taken at the Fair Grounds on opening day of the Fair before 10 am.
- 24. Checks not cashed by November 1 of the year issued will be cancelled and no reimbursement considered. Checks will be issued not later than October 1 of the year of the Fair.
- 25. The Board of Directors reserves the right to adjust any and all premium money according to reimbursement by the State of New York.
- 26. Any species of animal for which there is an approved rabies vaccine must be inoculated against rabies at least 14 days prior to the opening day of the Fair and this information must be included on the health chart.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

- 1. The entrance of all departments with the exception of 4-H, FFA, School, will be 10% of the first premium competed for, except as stated under department heading. All entrance fees must be paid at the time the entries are made.
- 2. The premiums awarded will be designated as follows: FIRST, blue; SECOND, red; THIRD, white.
- 3. Every exhibitor must purchase an exhibitor's pass before making entries, except those exhibiting in the School and 4-H Club departments.
- 4. To any exhibitor paying (\$15.00) fifteen dollars or over in entry fees on livestock, a helpers or attendants pass may be purchased at a cost of (\$15.00) fifteen dollars each.
- 5. All entry tags must be shown on every exhibit in a conspicuous place.
- 6. No premiums will be awarded on articles not listed in catalog.
- 7. Exhibitors will not be permitted to add or to change entries after entries are transferred to Secretary's book.
- 8. Anyone 3 years and older must pay admission at the gate.

SPECIAL REGULATION FOR ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

1. Entry forms for ALL Livestock Departments must be mailed to the Fair Secretary by June 30th and accompanied with the correct entry fee.

- An Exhibitor may make two entries in a class.
- 3. Grain, hay and bedding must be furnished by Exhibitor
- 4. 4-H and FFA Exhibitors may show their animals in the open classes on payment of the regular entry fee.
- Entries from 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will be accepted up to the time of the open show provided the animal was entered on time for the Junior Show.
- 6. All Livestock entries are to be on the grounds by 12 Noon opening day of the Fair with the exception of Departments D& E.
- All Livestock are released and may leave the grounds at 6 pm the last day of the Fair. Violators will forfeit premiums.
- 8. Stall cards must be in place for all Livestock exhibits. Cards will be available at the Fair office in case an exhibitor does not have their own.
- 9. All Junior and open Livestock exhibitor wishing to bring a camper or tent for the week for the Fair must pre-register with the Fair Secretary by July 1st. Sites will be assigned on a first come, first served basis in an area designated by the Fair Office. All horse and cattle trailers after unloading must be parked in a designated area. NOT next to the Livestock Barns.

Rules for Dairy Show:

- 1. Entry forms in this Department must be to the Fair Secretary by June 30th.
- 2. Every exhibitor must purchase an Exhibitors pass.
- 3. All entries open to the world.
- 4. All entry fees shall be \$3.00 per individual class and per group class.
- 5. No animal may be borrowed or leased for show purposes. Papers will be inspected in show ring. All papers must be in the name of the exhibitor on opening date of the Fair. No pending papers.
- 6. When there is only one entry in a class, the judge will award the premium which, in his opinion, the quality warrants.
- 7. No animal may receive a premium unless properly groomed for show.
- 8. Entries are to be on the grounds at 6 pm Thursday of the Fair and are released at 6 pm last day of the Fair.
- 9. All cattle are to be accompanied by the proper health papers. (Read the health requirements available from the Superintendent.)
- 10. Exhibitors or their agents MUST BE PRESENT when animals are brought into the show ring and will present entry tags to the Superintendent or his assistants. Failure to comply with this rule will cause forfeited premiums.
- 11. Cows in milk may be brought in on the day of the show.
- 12. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per group class.

Rules for Beef Show:

- All breeding cattle must be registered with their respective national association for breed registry. Certificates of registration (except steers) will be required on every animal 6 months of age or older, except when entering section E.
- 2. All entries must have a legible tattoo or other means of permanent identification.
- 3. Entries are to be on the grounds at 6 pm Thursday of the Fair and are released at 6 pm last day of the Fair.
- 4. The show will be held on Saturday. See Superintendent for time.
- Entries must have photocopies of the certificates of registration or the file copy mailed with the entry. Photocopies are necessary for eligibility for the show catalog typist and proof of breeder and owner. Do not send originals.
- The livestock Superintendent reserves the right to combine sections and/or classes with few entries so as to not exceed the maximum age span of three months, and also to split large classes.
- 7. The livestock superintendent reserves the right to inspect and reject any entrant not in compliance.
